MONEY MATTERS FOR KIDS

A key reason that it is important for you, as a parent, to teach your kids financial lessons is because you can share your money values through those lessons. If you value giving to others, you can instil that value in your children by helping make it a habit for them from an early age.

How to Teach Pre-Schoolers and Kindergartners About Money

1. Use a clear jar to save.

The piggy bank is a great idea, but it doesn't give kids a visual. When you use a clear jar, they see the money growing. Yesterday, they had a 2-rupee coins, 5-rupee coins and 10-rupee coins. Today, they have 50 rupees currency note, 100 currency rupees note, etc., Talk through this with them and make a big deal about it growing!

2. Set an example.

A study by the University of Cambridge found that money habits in children are formed by the time they're 7 years old.(1) Little eyes are watching you. If you're slapping down plastic every time you go out to dinner or the grocery store, they'll eventually notice. Or if you and your spouse are arguing about money, they'll notice that too. Set a healthy example for them and they'll be much more likely to follow it when they get older.

3. Show them that stuff costs money.

You've got to do more than just say, "That pack of toy cars costs 500 rupees." Help them grab a few amount out of their jar, take it with them to the store, and physically hand the money to the cashier. This simple action will have more impact than a five-minute lecture.
